Fields-Ertel Road Widening Project to Begin

Lebanon, Ohio – Deerfield Township, Warren County, Ohio – Fields-Ertel Road Widening Project, mainly between Snider Road and Wilkens Blvd., will begin on Monday, October 28th, 2024. This project will widen Fields-Ertel Road from two (2) lanes to five (5) lanes which will include retaining walls, profile adjustments, storm sewers, sidewalks, and associated roadway items. This project will also include improvements along Fields-Ertel Road west of Snider Road, improvements along Snider Road north and south of Fields-Ertel Road, and improvements on Wilkens Blvd. just north of Fields-Ertel Road. This improvement will help ease congestion and support better connectivity and travel times which will make this section of road safer for those to travel this roadway. This project is projected to be complete in October 2026.

This project will be constructed by the John R. Jurgensen Company for a bid amount of \$18,611,588.44. This project is funded by the Federal Surface Transportation Block Grant, Ohio Public Works Commission, Deerfield Township Trustees, Symmes Township Trustees, Hamilton County Engineer's Office, and Warren County Engineer's Office through the Warren County Transportation Improvement District.

About the Warren County Engineer

County Engineers in Ohio are required by law to be registered as both Professional Engineers (P.E.) and Professional Surveyors (P.S.) They are responsible for the maintenance and construction of county roads and maintenance and construction of bridges on county roads, township roads, and certain streets within municipalities. They are also responsible for maintaining land surveying records, checking the accuracy and adequacy of recorded land transfer documents, and establishing or re-establishing certain land survey monuments.
